



Grant at work

Ray DeLong works on the trench for the water supply from a generous neighbor to the Lodi Whittier library, made possible by a grant from Seneca Meadows Landfill. Lodi Whittier Free Library Director Mary-Catherine French accepted the grant to provide much needed infrastructure for the library. Until recently, the Lodi library has had to rely on a 300 gallon water storage tank, which often ran dry. "We thank Seneca Meadows and our generous neighbor so much for their ongoing support of our community," offered French. The neighbor has allowed access to their private well, and the grant provided over 75% of the funds needed to complete the job of digging, plumbing and legal work associated with a right-of-way and use agreement. The landfill has also recently helped Waterloo Boy Scout Troops 72, 74, and 81 with a grant to assist with hosting the annual Klondike Derby which was held at the Fuzzy-Guppies-Waterloo Harbor Campground, Waterloo, last weekend (Jan. 27-28). Twenty three troops from the Mohawk District, which includes the Seneca Waterways Boy Scout Council, converged on the campground with an attendance of more than two hundred scouts. The event featured various activities and competitions. The goal is to encourage building friendships, increase Scout knowledge through competitions and promote the Scout Law and Scout Spirit. The Waterloo troops were charged with hosting the event for the next five years at Fuzzy Guppies, who donated use of the facility. The grant was used to purchase supplies and food required to host the derby.

Board Member Herb Meyer updated the board on the proposed water line for the Reed, Hecker, Brewer and Mills Roads and Route 96 area.
